Minutes of the 92nd Spring Meeting of the AAVSO, Held April 23–26, 2003, Tucson, Arizona

The 92nd Spring Meeting of the AAVSO opened with the Executive Board Meeting in the morning of Wednesday, April 23, and the Council Meeting that afternoon. That evening was a welcome dinner buffet at the hotel for all members.

On Thursday, April 24, the University of Arizona Mirror Lab was open for tours in the morning, and in the afternoon and evening, members were invited to tour Kitt Peak National Observatory, followed by an observing session.

On Friday, April 25 a very productive and informative workshop was held on Photometric Data Bases and Data Analysis Techniques, in the morning and early afternoon. This was followed by the first paper session (a list of papers presented at the paper sessions is attached to these minutes). The paper session was opened by a welcoming message from co-host David Levy on behalf of Tim Hunter and himself. In the evening, David and Wendee Levy hosted a star party at their "telescope ranch" for attendees.

The membership meeting was called to order on April 26 at 9:02 am by President Daniel Kaiser.

Secretary Martha Hazen said that the minutes of the October 2002 Annual Meeting will appear in the *Journal of the AAVSO*.

Co-host Tim Slater of the University of Arizona then officially welcomed the AAVSO to Tucson.

Treasurer Lou Cohen presented his semi-annual report for the period October 1, 2002, through March 31, 2003. He noted that the Association is carrying a larger deficit than can be sustained for a long period. He read the statement adopted by the Council:

The council believes the main priority for AAVSO today is to complete the validation of our database as quickly as possible, ideally by the end of FY2003–2004. To achieve this, we must continue to spend money at our current rate until validation is complete. This means that we are drawing funds from our endowments at a rate that, because of the current financial climate, will likely result in decreased income from our investments in the future. Nevertheless, we believe this is the right thing to do in order to fulfill the scientific mission of the AAVSO.

President Kaiser thanked the Treasurer for his services during such difficult times.

There was no report from the Supernova Search Committee.

Director Janet Mattei presented the list of 63 new members accepted at the Council Meeting on April 23. She described the current distribution of members and observers. The total membership now stands at 1239.

Director Mattei read the list of members and observers deceased since the last meeting. They are Joseph Anderer, Steven Ashe, Casper Hossfield, William J. Krywos, Wayne Lowder, Ernst Mayer, and Robert Miller. Members and guests stood for a moment of silence to honor these late members and observers.

Director Mattei announced that the Annual Meeting in the fall of 2003 would be solely for the purpose of Executive Board and Council Meetings, and a Membership Meeting to hear reports and elect the Council. No support services for other than Executive Board and Council members will be offered. The Spring Meeting of 2004 will be on July 21–24 at the Chabot Observatory near Oakland, CA, by joint invitation of the AAVSO, the Astronomical League, and the Association of Lunar and Planetary Observers. This will involve celebration of the 35th anniversary of the moon landing. There will be Executive Board and Council meetings in late April or early May, 2004.

Director Mattei then presented her semi-annual report. Highlights of this report include:

- · Significant progress on the validation of data
- Continued increase in AAVSO website activity
- Link of AAVSO data base with SIMBAD
- Responded to 173 requests for AAVSO data
- Production of several more monographs
- · Production and distribution of several hundred revised and new charts

Janet mentioned that there will be a new website in May. The full Director's Report will appear in the *Journal of the AAVSO*.

After the Director's Report there was a discussion of how to ensure that CCD observations are able to be put on a uniform system. Visual observers must also report the chart date and comparison stars used.

The Membership Meeting was adjourned at 11:35 am, and was followed by the group photo.

Following a lunch break, Scientific Paper Session #2 convened. (The list of papers is attached to these minutes).

The Closing Banquet for the meeting was held that evening at the Marriott Hotel. Observer Awards were presented and those attending received their awards in person. A complete list of the award recipients will appear in the *Journal of the*

AAVSO. Director's Awards were presented to Richard Huziak of Canada, who received it in person, and Gary Poyner of the United Kingdom. Since there is not going to be a full Annual Meeting of the AAVSO this year, the William Tyler Olcott Award for Distinguished Service, which would ordinarily be presented at that time, was presented to Edward A. Halbach of Estes Park, Colorado, for his promotion of variable stars, and for his mentoring of amateur astronomers and young people. Following the awards, Janet gave an illustrated talk about her travels for the AAVSO.
